

# Runners brave chilly weather

Despite wind chill factors in the low 30s, 150 runners turned out for this year's Dolphin Dash races at Anna Maria Elementary School.

Most of the students ran in the one-mile run, but six-year-old Daniel Sentman also participated in the 5-K run. He was the youngest runner in that race.

Walter said she was honored by one of the runners this year.
